KUOW, the University of Washington FM outlet, serves as a training laboratory for future broadcasters, and extends the university far beyond the limits of the campus.

Through its membership in the National Association of Educational Broadcasters —an organization that operates what a mounts to a "taped network"—KUOW is able to present outstanding programs from all parts of the world

In addition to programs from the N. A. E. B., the non-commercial outlet receives programs from the British Broadcasting Corp., Radio Australia and other sources.

KING-FM's Jazz from the Penthouse continues to be one of the longest-running live-remote broadcasts presently on the air in Seattle.

Originating with an hour-long special which featured Ernestine Anderson, the show became a weekly half-hour feature the following month. Since that time, early in 1962, over 90 shows have originated from the Pioneer Square nightspot.

Jazz from the Penthouse, heard at 9:30 o'clock Thursday nights (when talent is in town), has featured nearly all of today's jazz greats, including Dizzy Gillse Gilles-pie, The Modern Jazz Quartet, Oscar Peterson, George Shearing and others.
