Professor Fleming, Inventor of Valve, Gets Faraday Medal

ONDON, Wednesday, May 16,—
J. A. Fleming, inventor of the first radio valve, has been awarded the Faraday Medal by the Institution of Electrical Engineers.

This is the seventh award of the nedal, which is allotted by the Counmental, which is allotted by the Coun-cil of the Institution once a year, either for notable scientific or in-dustrial achievement in electrical engineering, or for conspicious serv-ice rendered to the advancement of

ice rendered to the advancement or electrical science.
Professor Fleming has been intimately associated with the development of all the great applications of electrical science for twenty-five years—the telephone, electric lighting, and wiwless telegraphy.
He invented the thermionic valve, (vacuum tube) which revolutionized wireless telegraphy and made wireless telephony possible.
