

Distributors To Aid Dealers In Video Showings

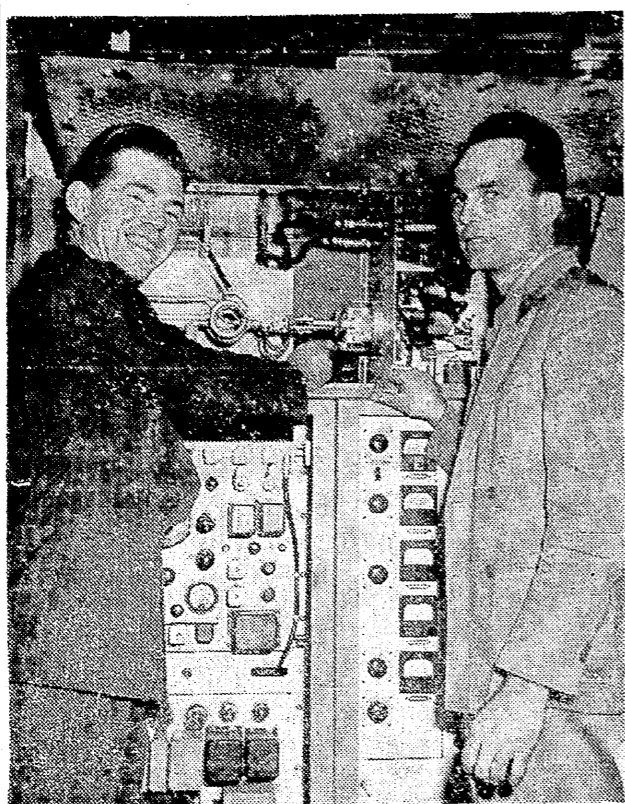
Seattle television-set distributors plan to provide a series of one-hour television programs which will be telecast by KRSC-TV during shopping hours, from 1 to 2 p. m., on five of the days following TV-Day tomorrow.

This means that those who are interested in television sets actually can witness a first-class television program on the sets in dealers' stores from 1 to 2 p. m. on Friday, November 26; Saturday, November 27; Monday, November 29; Tuesday, November 30; and Wednesday, December 1.

This schedule of special programs supplements the station's regular late afternoon and evening programs. Included in these special television bills are several outstanding network programs that are now running in the East. They include: Lucky Pup, Face the Music, Please, Please!, To the Queen's Taste, Peoples' Platform, and Winner Take All.

The public also will be advised, according to Herb E. Zobrist, chairman of the Seattle television distributors' committee, as to these special telecasts through display cards in the windows of those dealers who handle the sales and installation of television sets.

"We anticipate that television will become one of the leading industries of the Pacific Northwest and of the nation," said Zobrist. "However, it is our belief that television will supplement regular radio broadcasting, rather than supplant it—as homeowners will wish to have both facilities at their disposal for home entertainment. It is estimated that there are approximately 1,000 sets already installed in the Seattle area and that that number will be increased to over 3,000 by January 1. Installations are going ahead rapidly and many homeowners will view the first television program on Thanksgiving Day," Zobrist said.

Twenty-four hours after the kick-off in Pasadena, KRSC-TV will present the entire Rose Bowl game to football fans in Seattle. This is not a motion picture, but an actual telecast recorded on film in Los Angeles and rushed by air to KRSC-TV, and will be presented beginning at 2 p. m. on Sunday, January 2. C. B. S. television cameras in Pasadena will pick the game up, and, through the medium of teletranscription, this and other important events across the country, will be available to Seattle viewers on Sunday.

BRIDGE LESSON

Opening No-Trump
Neither side vulnerable. South deals.

The bidding:

Have you ever "kibitzed" a bridge game in which one player appears to have a decided advantage over the other three participants? If so, you may have observed the frequency with which opening no-trump bids were made on hands not always suited for the purpose. The idea is to effect

a slight hogging of the play. Inasmuch as most game contracts are played at no-trump, the urge is to get in that bid before partner has the opportunity, lest he become declarer.

In my opinion, this is losing bridge. Not that I do not love of the stronger player making a decided effort to become declarer. On the contrary, I do. But I think that such an effort should be postponed until later in the auction. My observation has been that the inexperienced player has greater difficulty responding to opening no-trump bids than to bids of one in a suit. He never seems to know whether to show his suit, raise the no-trump or pass, with the result that the opening bidder must do considerable guessing on the next round.

This is not as it should be, because in reality, responding to no-trump openings is not complicated at all. Assuming the hand is not unbalanced, responder should raise, on the basis of actual count, to two no-trump with a little over one and one half honor tricks (point count of 8) or three no-trump with about

two and one-half honor tricks (point count of 10).

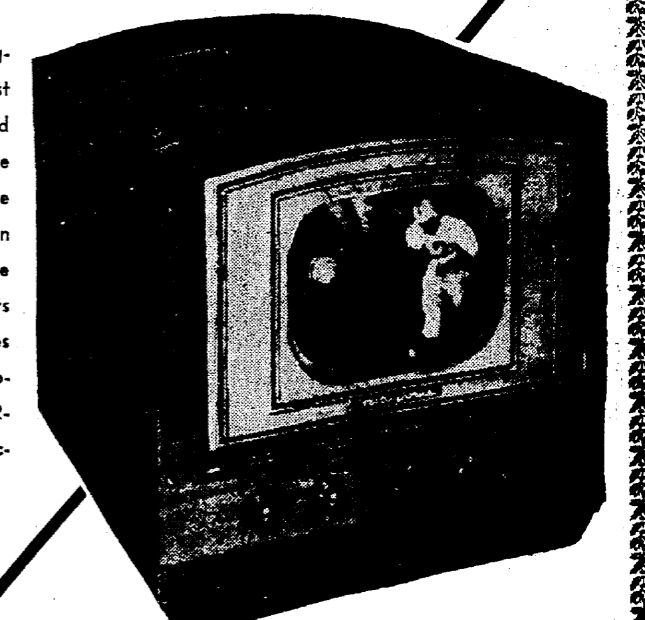
Today's hand presented a bidding problem to even the more experienced players in a tournament held not long ago. Most of them preferred to open with one no-trump and found difficulty in reaching the best contract. Three final contract and even with a club lead into the tenace, declarer was unable to score more than eight tricks.

Experience has shown that it is undesirable to conceal the holding of a four-card major suit.

In today's hand North responded to the opening bid with two diamonds. This does not denote a bust as some players mistakenly believe. It merely says, "Partner, I am unable to raise you to two no-trump because I have not enough in high cards, but I have just a little too much to pass." South now regretted that he had not shown his major suit and did so belatedly by bidding two spades. This gave North's hand new glamor and he lost no time in going to game. (Copyright, 1948)

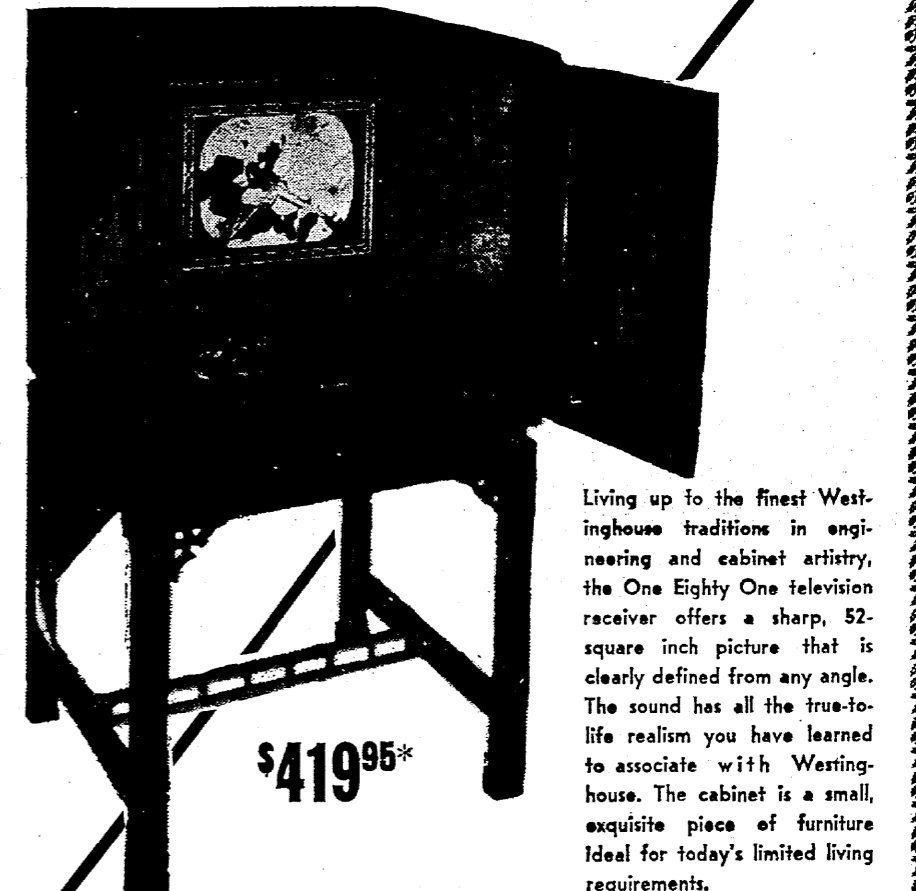
