Radio Field Gained Genius

The four tuning condensers in the new Kolster models are supported in a frame similar to an automobile crankcase and the control knob runs very smoothly. The designer, Dr. Frederick A. Kolster, also is inventor of the radio compass used on ships, and the wavemeters used by government radio inspectors.

Dr. Frederick Kolster, Son of Noted Violinist, Has Added Much to Science of Air Communication With His Inventions.

A PROMISING artist was lost to the musical world when Frederick Kolster, son of a famous violinist, decided to make radio his career instead of the musical one for which his father had been training him, and became one of America's leading radio research engineers.

Dr. Frederick Kolster, the man who during a quarter of a century spent in radio research work, has protected navigation by inventing the Kolster radio compass, the radio fog signal system and the mobile radio beacon to protect ships in fog, has also given to engineers and government inspectors the decremeter for measuring the wavelength and damping of radio oscillations. Dr. Kolster was a prominent figure in establishing America's first radio laws and is the founder of Uncle Sam's million-dollar radio laboratory in the Bureau of Standards at Washington, D. C.

Combining a love of mechanics with a thorough knowledge of music, Frederick Kolster became a student of radio at an early age and after years of experiment and study combined with practical work, in 1909 he assisted with the first tests in broadcasting grand opera. In 1912 he was appointed by the United States government to organize a radio section in the Bureau of Standards, which he headed for some time.

Recently Dr. Kolster has designed a broadcast receiver for the home, using his thorough knowledge of selectivity and reproduction. He patented the split circuit used in his sets. Five factories are now turning out radio products under his direction as chief research engineer of Federal-Brandes, Inc.

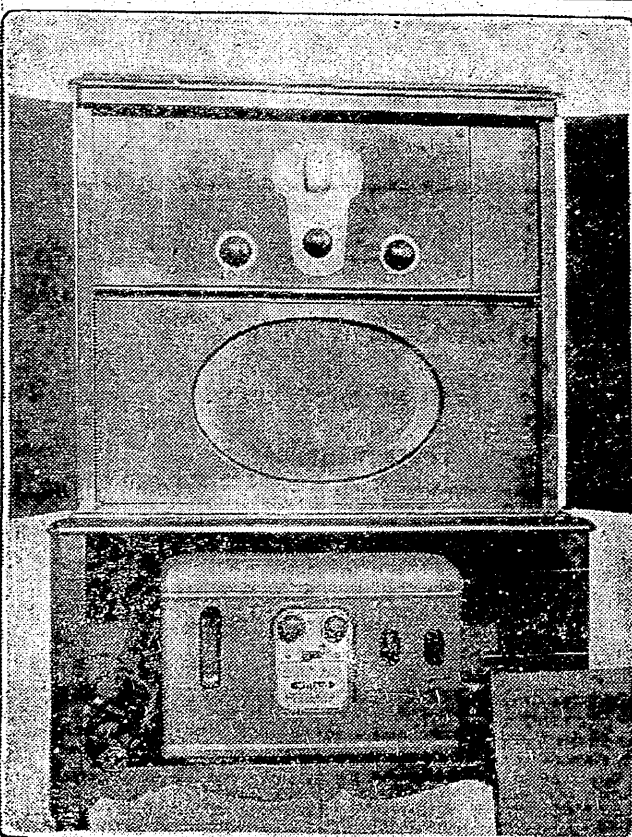

Vera Downs Pegg, coloratura soprano, will sing a selection from "Rose Marie" and "Indian Love Call" by Friml, as features of the concert.

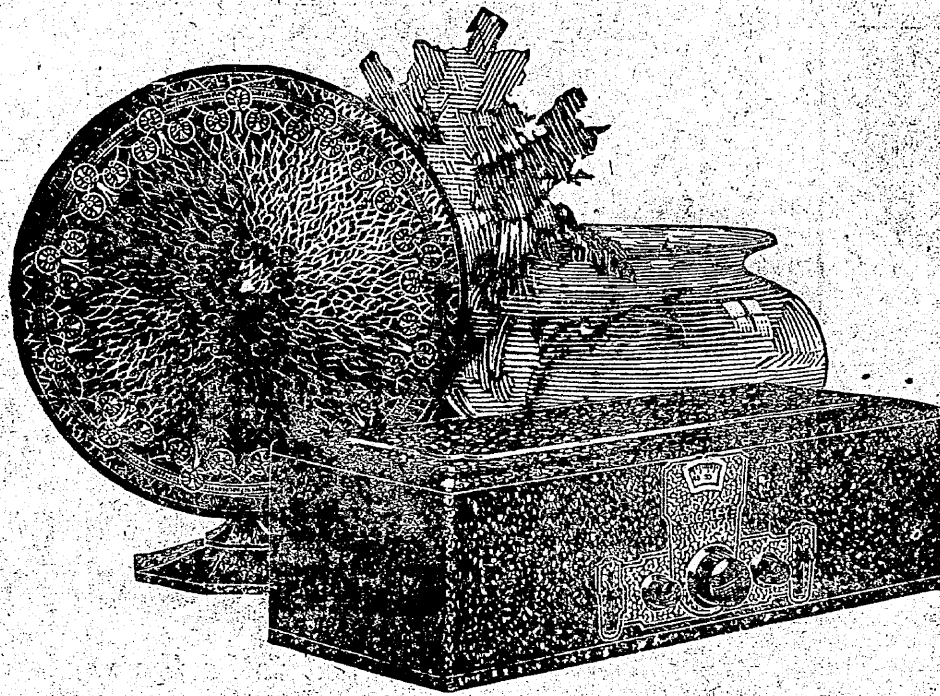
Charging the Battery.
